
## IMMERSE YOURSELF IN THE WORLD OF YESTERDAY

One of the Oranger Garten's main attractions is the Pavilion with its state-of-the-art technology, where you can experience the history of Migros with all your senses. On your own terms, of course: you decide what you want to glance at and what you want to investigate more closely. Are you interested in how people used to prepare for their driving test in a driving laboratory 50 years ago? Do you wonder what the products your grandmother bought looked like? And how much she paid for them? What were the advertisements for consumer goods like 70 years ago? In the Pavilion, you can discover what has influenced and shaped the everyday life of Swiss consumers from 1925 right up until the present day.

**Shelf of History.** These wall-sized screens have 120 shelves of audiovisual material from the Migros archives from the last 90 years. Your smallest hand movement, not even a touch, will make the screens react.

**Media Table.** Here, you can investigate further themes about the Migros retail trade and Swiss consumer history in more depth, with over 250 multifaceted information units.

**Tip.** Our technology is learnable through play. If something doesn't work straight away, simply ask your own or someone else's children – they intuitively understand modern technology and how to use it.









### A VISIONARY IN A HAT

Gottlieb Duttweiler was a Zurich businessman. Young, bold, and prepared to take a risk. Up until 1920, he traded in cocoa, rice, heating oil, coffee, olives, turpentine and vitriol. Buying, importing and selling, he was successful at first, but then the crisis years drove him to his knees. So, he emigrated to Brazil to try his luck as a farmer. He was soon drawn back to Switzerland, however. He wanted to try again: in 1925, Gottlieb Duttweiler sent five Migros sales vans out onto the streets. His idea behind the mobile shops: lower the costs and halve the profit in order to make the prices unbeatable. And the people came. And bought. And came again. From then on, the visionary in a hat simply moved from one success to the next.

Ten theme and event islands show important stages and facets of Migros business history since its foundation in 1925. The open areas show the Oranger Garten as a living space which is continually changing, just like Migros itself. The planting changes each season but the orange ground tones are constant, uniting harmoniously with the colours of spring, summer, autumn and winter.

The Park im Grüene is just 20 steps away from the Oranger Garten; just cross the Zürcherstrasse to find yourself right in the middle of a spacious park landscape. In 1946, Migros founder Gottlieb Duttweiler and his wife Adele donated this private property to the «Im Grüene» Foundation. They wanted to create a quiet and relaxing place, open to everyone. The «Dutti Park» offers a wonderful view over Lake Zurich from its eastern side and has a children's playground, deckchairs which can be used free of charge, multi-purpose open spaces and a restaurant with a sun terrace.

**Food & drink.** Bring a picnic or eat in the park restaurant. This offers fresh products, reasonable prices and friendly staff. **Cultural and children's programmes.** Depending on the season, there are Punch and Judy shows, donkey rides, concerts, cinema and lots more.
